

New Uniform Information

You will be aware of the changes to uniform from September 2022. Here is a quick reminder.

Next year's Year 7s will wear the new uniform when they join us in September 2022. This will be compulsory for all year 7 students.

The current Year 7-9 students will be given until the follow year (September 2023) to 'transition' to the new uniform. This means that from September 2023 the new uniform will be worn by every year group.

The new uniform comprises of a white shirt, KS3 or KS4 tie, blue jumper with school logo for all year groups, 'school grey' trousers or school Meole Brace School skirt. Shoes should be smart, plain black leather (or leather look) with no sports logo evident. Trainers and boots (including Airforce 1) are not permitted.

The only items that have to be bought from our main uniform provider (School Shop Direct) is the tie, jumper with school logo and the one option skirt - everything else can be bought from other sources should you wish to do so.

There is nothing stopping current Year 7-9 students opting to wear the new uniform in September 2022, but given some families will have purchased new uniform this year, it seemed more reasonable to give families a year to transition across. Students in these year groups will need to wear either the new uniform or the old uniform. A mixture of new and old uniform will not be permitted.

Students in current Year 9 who decide to stay in the current uniform for 2022/23 may continue to wear their KS3 sweatshirt if they wish, rather than buying a KS4 sweat shirt which will only be permitted for one year.

The school shop is offering an early order discount of 7% off the standard price for all Meole Brace School uniform. The discount will be automatically applied at the till or for online purchases (www.schoolshopdirect.co.uk) use order code EARLYORDER22. This discount applies from June 20th to July 23rd 2022.

Other Areas to Consider:

- Shirts should be plain white cotton. (short or long sleeve).
- Students may wear one stud type earring per ear and a watch.
- Tights should be plain black or natural.
- Extremes of hairstyles / hair colour are not permitted.
- No false nails or nail polish students will be instructed to remove if worn.
- No false eye lashes or excess makeup.
- All forms of facial piercing are strictly forbidden.
- No other forms of visible jewellery are permitted. <u>These will be confiscated</u> <u>if worn.</u>
- Hoodies are not permitted as part of school uniform.
- Coats should be waterproof and plain design.
- During summer term school grey shorts will be permitted for all students who wish to wear them.

Child Exploitation in Shropshire

How to recognise if your child may be being exploited, and what you can do to help reduce the risks



What is Exploitation?

Are you concerned about changes in your child's behaviour? Have you noticed that they may be feeling under pressure from influences from outside your family home? Realising that your child could be being exploited can be distressing, but help and support is available.

Exploitation is a form of abuse, it occurs where an individual or group takes advantage of an imbalance of power to coerce, manipulate or deceive a child, young person or adult into any activity that results in an advantage for the perpetrator. Specific types of Exploitation include **Sexual Exploitation**, **Criminal Exploitation**, and **Financial Exploitation**.

Who does it affect?

Exploitation can happen to any young person from any background, in any part of the country - including Shropshire. The young person often isn't aware that they are a victim, as exploiters are very clever in the way they manipulate the young person into trusting them.

What are the signs?

- New friendship groups, who may be older in age
- Engaging in sexual activity, including exchanging indecent photos
- Missing episodes, when you don't know their whereabouts
- Spending less time at home and distancing from previous friends
- Receiving gifts & rewards
- Increased secretiveness
- Disengagement from school & hobbies
- Use of drugs or alcohol, perhaps without the means to afford this
- A decline in mental health, possibly becoming more aggressive
- Possession of a weapon
- Committing low level crimes

What can I do as a parent or carer?

Ø	Discuss differences between healthy and unhealthy friendships and relationships
V	Stay alert to any changes in behaviour which may indicate that they are feeling under pressure
Ø	Carefully monitor any episodes of staying out late or not returning home
V	Be aware of who they are spending time with and encourage them to keep in touch by texting you when they are out in the community
Ø	Report them missing if you do not know where they are
Ø	Talk openly to your child about keeping safe and listen calmly if they confide in you
V	Regularly check the young person's possessions for drugs and any unexplained money or gifts
\square	Install online safety features and apps
\checkmark	Check in with parents of their friends
Ø	Be cautious of any older friends or friendships where there appears to be a power imbalance
V	Check in with school or college to see if they have noticed any changes in behaviour
V	Share your concerns with school staff or Children's Services

Report concerns about a child

Shropshire's TREES (Together Reducing & Ending Exploitation in Shropshire) Hub are based within Children's Services. We are committed to identifying young people who are at risk of exploitation, and supporting professionals and families to reduce these risks. It is recognised that these risks are out in the community, rather than within the family home. This is what is known as **Contextual Safeguarding**.

We can offer social care support to families where appropriate, or we can signpost to another support service such as a substance misuse service, sexual abuse support service, Early Help or diversionary activities - with the aim of disrupting exploitation and reducing the risks going forward.




School Shop


